

921 – PCC Elective: Early Anxieties and Unrepresented States

Target Audience: This course is appropriate for clinicians at the intermediate to advanced levels.

Prerequisites: Students will need a basic exposure to and understanding of psychoanalytic theory and its application to the treatment of patients. Applicants can meet this requirement through previous coursework, training, or supervision (e.g., PCC's 101 Fundamentals course; psychoanalytic coursework or supervision in graduate school/residency or post-graduation). Applicants who do not meet this requirement may register for the course with permission of the instructor, <u>Michelle Kwintner</u>, <u>PhD</u>, <u>LCSW</u>.

Format: This class will combine lecture and seminar formats, mainly relying on seminar with discussion. The instructor will invite students to bring thoughts and questions about the readings, to share clinical examples that the readings may bring to mind, and to offer any associations that will help us as a group to play with the concepts and to elaborate upon the ideas in the papers.

Description: In this course we will study together papers that aim to describe early anxieties and unrepresented states. How do we make contact with and describe our patients' experiences that emerged at a time when there were no words? What of experiences that may have never been represented or those aspects of the social context now calling for articulation after decades of operating unconsciously? We will read a sampling of the analytic literature, primarily from Object Relations Theory, on these types of anxieties and unrepresented states and discuss considerations of technique.

Course Syllabus: Early Anxieties and Unrepresented States

Required Readings: Readings will be on PEPWeb. Pdfs and links for non-PEPWeb readings will be provided.

Michelle Kwintner, PhD, LCSW was an early student of Bill Meyer and Harold Kudler in the Basics course during 1999-2000. She completed her psychoanalytic training at the International Psychotherapy Institute (IPI) based in Bethesda, MD. Michelle has taught in several programs at IPI with a theoretical perspective based on (but not limited to) Object Relations Theory. She served as Curriculum Chair of the analytic training program, and currently serves on the Colleague Assistance Committee. She is a consulting editor for *Psychoanalytic Social Work* and maintains an interest in Community Mental Health, a topic she's published on. She is a member of APsA and of IPA. As a member of IPA's Teleanalysis Working Group she presented papers at the IPA Precongress. She practices psychoanalysis and psychotherapy with adults in Ithaca, NY, and offers consultation via Zoom.

- 1. Describe and compare the different positions according to Melanie Klein and Thomas Ogden.
- 2. Define projective identification and give at least one example of how it functions in everyday life or in a clinical situation.
- 3. Compare different types and levels of intervention based upon considerations of assessment.
