Target Audience: This course is intended for clinicians at beginning through intermediate levels.

Format: This online class will combine lecture and seminar formats; student participation is encouraged. PCC courses include group discussions, which require participants to read and synthesize the materials presented. PCC faculty ensure that gaps in knowledge are addressed *Class is limited to 30 participants.*

Prerequisites: Clinicians at any level who bring interest in learning about psychoanalytic thinking and group therapy.

Description: This 8-session elective introduces participants to group therapy through a psychoanalytic lens, exploring how the unconscious life of the group emerges in interactions among members and between the group and its leader. Through a blend of didactic and experiential learning, the course highlights stages of group development, levels of analysis, and the distinctive curative factors that make group work a powerful treatment modality. Attention will be given to transference, countertransference, resistance, and cultural enactments as they unfold in the group matrix, as well as the leader's role in facilitating insight, engaging unconscious processes, and navigating group dynamics. By the end, participants will gain a richer appreciation for the artistry and complexity of group process as a psychoanalytic endeavor.

Course Syllabus: Art of Group Process

She is certified in Relational Psychoanalysis and in Mindful Facilitation, which along with an affirmative social justice lens informs all her work. Currently she facilitates trauma support groups as well as BIPOC and Intercultural training process groups for therapists.

Ms. Harris founded Intercultural Network LLC to address the needs of organizations in their efforts to become more equitable and inclusive. She designs and facilitates customized training for clinical, educational, and religious institutions, and other non-profit organizations. For 20 years, Ms. Harris served as faculty at Bryn Mawr College's Graduate School of Social Service and Social Research. She is the Past-President of the Philadelphia Area Group Psychotherapy Society (PAGPS) and serves on the Board of the American Group Psychotherapy Association. Ms. Harris is a Certified Group Psychotherapist and Fellow of the American Group Psychotherapy Association.
